

Preparation Hints:

- 4. Be aware of similar works or other works from the same opus by your composer. For example, if you are performing a 1st movement (which is part of a 3 movement work), have an understanding of the other two movements. Similarly, if you are playing a section from a larger work (for example, a Suite, then have a working knowledge of the construction, key plan and character of the whole work)
- 5. Great information can be found online but make sure your sources are reputable and verified
- 6. Don't forget to LISTEN to other performances of your chosen works
